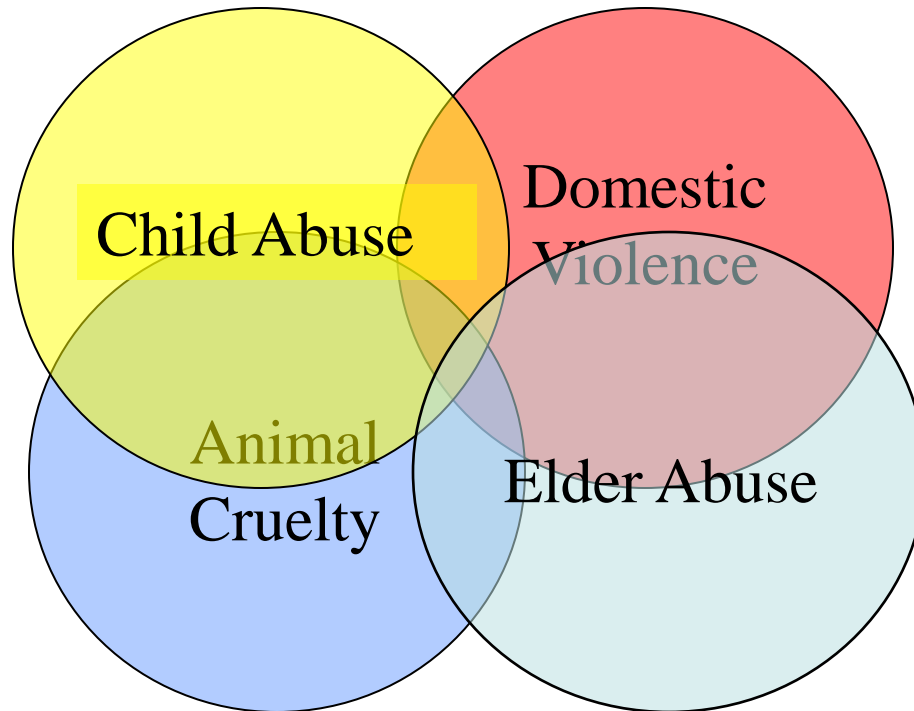

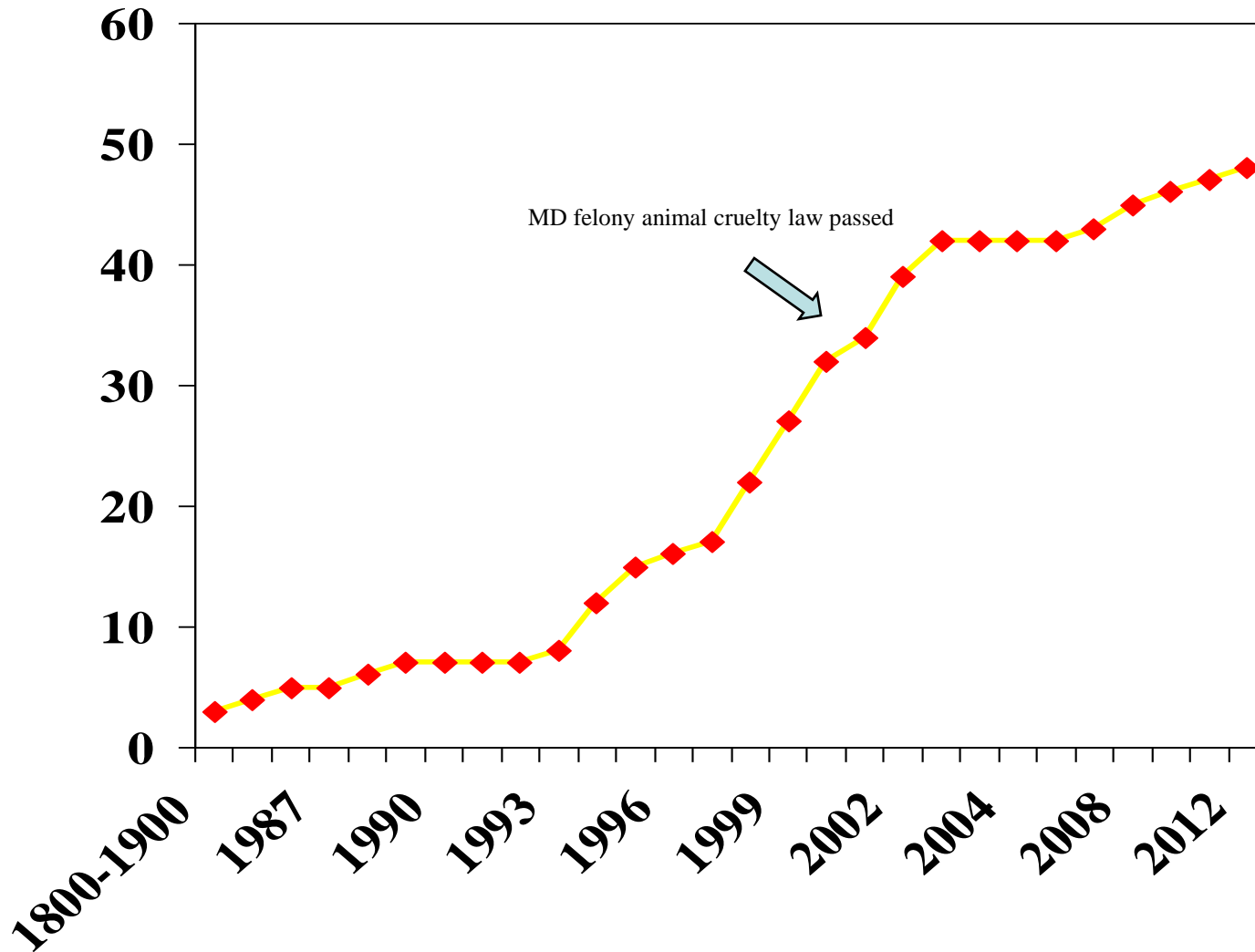

Timetable of the Baltimore Commission

- May 27, 2009 – “Phoenix” was burned, allegedly by two teenage boys



Timetable of the Baltimore Commission

May 31, 2009 - Despite extensive veterinary efforts, she succumbed to kidney failure and was euthanized . The crime sparked a public outcry and national media attention.

Timetable of the Baltimore Commission

- June 8 – ASPCA President Ed Sayres contacted Baltimore Mayor Sheila Dixon offering support in establishing a task force to review the problem of animal cruelty in the city of Baltimore and make recommendations for addressing the issue.
- July 8, 2009 – Mayor Dixon announced the formation of the Mayor's Anti-Animal Abuse Task Force, which begins meeting at City Hall the following month..
- Groups represented include City Council, Bureau of Animal Control, Office of the State's Attorney, Baltimore Police Dept., Baltimore Sheriff's Dept., Health Dept., BARCS, Maryland SPCA, Snyder Foundation, Recycled Love and ASPCA



Original Mandate of the Task Force

Make recommendations regarding:

- Ways to eradicate animal abuse in City of Baltimore, including dogfighting
- Methods of Increasing awareness of animal cruelty laws
- Suggested legislation to protect animals and prosecute abusers
- Recommended training for law enforcement officials and animal control on how to handle animal cruelty cases
- Recommended steps to foster improved responses to incidents of animal cruelty

Timetable of the Baltimore Commission

- September 16, 2009 – First public meeting to seek input about public concerns about animals
- Jan 5, 2010 – Interim Report delivered to Mayor Dixon with 30 initial recommendations for changes
- February 4, 2010 – Stephanie Rawlings-Blake replaced Dixon as Mayor. She met with Task Force members soon after taking office and promised full support.
- July 30, 2010 – Final task Force Report delivered to Mayor Rawlings-Blake with 47 recommendations

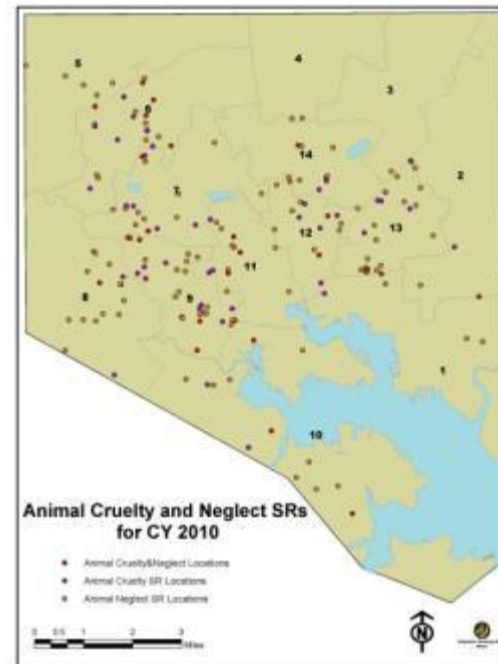
Timetable of the Baltimore Commission

- September 2010– Legislation was introduced in the Baltimore City Council to convert the Task Force into a permanent Commission which will be independent of any future political changes in the city.
- October 8, 2010 - The legislation passed and was signed by Mayor Rawlings-Blake, making this the nation's first permanent Commission to address animal cruelty

Activities and Accomplishments of the Baltimore Commission thus far:

- Reform to Reporting and Tracking
- Coordination of case response, establishment of a formal liaison to Baltimore PD

The Baltimore Anti-Animal Abuse Commission receives monthly maps of service requests related to animal cruelty and neglect calls to 911 and 311

Police find suspected dogfighting ring

Six emaciated pit bulls with bite wounds taken from home

Baltimore city police say they discovered a suspected dog fighting ring while conducting a drug raid at a home near Druid Hill Park on Friday night, and six animals were seized from the dwelling.

Det. Kevin Brown, a police spokesman, said police found six pit bulls, ranging in age from a three-month-old puppy to an elderly dog, while undertaking a drug raid at a home on the 2300 block of Edgemont Avenue in the Parkview/Woodbrook neighborhood Friday evening. All of the dogs had bite wounds, he said, and several had severe scarring. The dogs appeared emaciated, and their bones could be seen clearly through their coats, Brown said.

Police also found drug paraphernalia at the site. The animals were seized by officials from the city's animal control agency, and Brown said police are investigating the incident.

- **Public Awareness is increased**
 - Three boys are convicted in the May 2010 killing of a dog at the Carroll Pak Golf Course. The case is made possible through eye-witness testimony. The Snyder Foundation pays a \$3000 reward to the individual who provided the key testimony – the first time a reward has been paid for an animal cruelty case in Baltimore City.

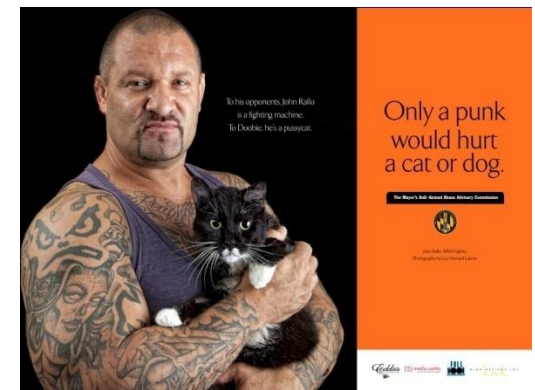
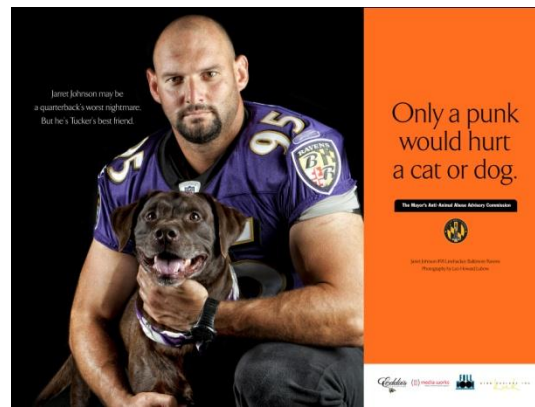




Leo Lubow takes approximately 300 photos at each shoot and an animal handler is available. He then works with a graphic designer and Sande Riesett to create the final product.

Mayor Rawlings-Blake Launches "Show Your Soft Side" Campaign To Prevent Animal Abuse And Neglect

Mayor was joined by Orioles outfielder Adam Jones and MMA fighter John Rallo.

Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake was joined by Council President Bernard "Jack" Young, Baltimore Orioles outfielder Adam Jones, MMA fighter John Rallo, members of the Mayor's Anti-Animal Abuse Advisory Commission, and concerned residents and business leaders to launch the "Show Your Soft Side" campaign. The campaign was developed to reduce the incidence of animal abuse in Baltimore, and features acknowledged "hard" men of Baltimore with their pets. Baltimore Ravens linebacker Jarret Johnson is also helping with the campaign, but could not attend today's announcement.



"It is an honor to stand with so many people willing to give their time and resources to help put an end to animal abuse," said Mayor Rawlings-Blake. "Together, we will reach out to young people in Baltimore to tell them that abusing a helpless animal is a sign of weakness, not strength."

Other Activities and Accomplishments of the Baltimore Commission thus far:

PASSED: Animal Cruelty, [H.B. 227/S.B. 115](#): Authorizing a court, as a condition of probation for specified violations concerning animal abuse, neglect, or cruelty, to prohibit the defendant from owning, possessing, or residing with an animal.

[House Votes](#) (138 yeas, 0 nays)

[Senate Votes](#) (47 yeas, 0 nays)

PASSED: Pet Protective Orders, [SB 747](#) & [HB 407](#): Authorizing a District Court Commissioner, in a specified interim protective order, and a judge, in a temporary protective order or final protective order, to award temporary possession of any pet of a person eligible for relief or a respondent.

[Senate Votes](#) (46 yeas, 0 nays)

- Professional Training
 - Police training on dogfighting
 - Judicial trainings on animal cruelty and human violence
- Anicare Training at Lane Treatment Center



Other Activities and Accomplishments of the Baltimore Commission thus far:

- Public Recognition

- May 2011 – Meetings were held with law enforcement and other officials in Milwaukee, Wisconsin seeking to implement changes Baltimore is making. Police training started February 2012
- Fall 2011 – The Commission received inquiries from around the country seeking to replicate the “Show Your Soft Side Campaign” in other communities
- November 2011- Caroline Griffin received the ASPCA Presidential Service Award, Mittens is named “Cat of the Year”
